VERNON VISIT



At the end of August we welcomed visitors from Vernon to mark the 10th Anniversary of our Friendship Pact, which was signed in 2006 by Nevill Swanson. The delegation from Vernon included three Deputy Mayors, a Councillor and members of their Twinning Association, who stayed with host families. Rosemary Campbell, who was Liaison Officer for Vernon, organised a varied and interesting programme of events, which culminated in a riverboat trip on Monday evening, and an opportunity for everyone to see the wonderful firework display from South Quay, signalling the end of the Worcester Festival.

On Saturday morning the visitors had a guided tour of Worcester, followed by a reception at the Mayor's parlour in the Guildhall.



In the afternoon they enjoyed tracing some of the origins of their town name at Hanbury Hall. Owned by the Vernon family until 1940 on the death of the last occupant, Sir George Vernon, upon which it was bequeathed to the National Trust. Followed by a celebration dinner at the Ketch in the evening.

Shortly after attending morning service at the Cathedral on Sunday, the visitors and Worcester members alike climbed to the top of the Worcestershire Beacon for a splendid view of the surrounding countryside. Vernon is famous for its annual Cherry Fair during Pentecost, and a visit to the Pershore Plum Fayre was a must for Bank Holiday Monday.

This was followed by high tea at Besford, where Liz Smith was on hand to cut the special anniversary cake and Hazel organised delicious homemade sandwiches, scones, cakes and of course local strawberries and fresh cream. The entire visit was a huge success and we reluctantly said goodbye to our guests on Tuesday morning.



This year 2017 we will be celebrating our 30th anniversary with our first twin Kleve. This year we will be hosting them here in Worcester. Arrangements' are still to be made, and I will keep you informed at a later date.

For 28 years of this bond between our two towns Les and Rose has been the backbone in bringing about a very happy and strong relationship between us and our German friends.

Unfortunately, this year they have decided to no longer continue their membership with our Twinning Association.

I'm sure you will all join with us in thanking them both very much for the hard work and devotion they have shown over such a long period of time.

Last September Gisela and I went with friends to the Dutch island of Texel, where we had also been years ago with Rosemary and Les.

On a very sunny day we first traveled to the beach and the lighthouse, and later to the little airport of Texel where a skydiver center is located.

When we arrived many skydivers came down and I felt like a child under the Christmas tree, because for years it was my wish to do a parachute jump. But Gisela was dead against it for many years; she said you can jump when I'm dead – don't worry she is still alive – but because I was so fascinated and enthusiastic she finally gave the green light and 15 minutes later, after a short instruction I was up in the air. We were 5 jumpers in the plane, 3 ladies in their 30s. And one lady of 85 and myself.



I was the first on the plane and the last to jump so I could watch them all getting out of the plane. We

went 3000m high and then we had to move to the open door – the point of no return-. My tandemmaster pushed me out of the door and for 30 seconds we had a free fall before he opened the parachute, and for 5 minutes we slowly got down; it was a fantastic experience. When we were at about 300 m he told me to lift my legs and then we safely landed.

I hope I can do it again next year; there is an airfield not too far from Kleve where they offer parachute jumps.

So that is something I really would like doing again.

The exhibition was held on an estate belonging to the municipality in the grounds of a nineteenth century house known as Wood Cottage.

Viewing was started by the Mayor of Le Vesinet at 11am on Saturday. The Club's prints were already suitably displayed in a tent conforming to the exhibition standard, ready for his inspection. The concept of "Street Photography" particularly intrigued our visitors.

Many of you will recall that we have a 'temporary' twinning with the village of Gouzeaucourt in northern France, part of the Council's commemoration of WW1 in memory of Worcester's 'adoption' of and assistance to, this devastated village. We have chosen to mark this twinning with an exhibition about our two communities. Applying for a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund was slow, mainly due to our inexperience. Getting together letters of support proved time-consuming and had to be attached to the application. Then, having been awarded the grant, there were dire warnings from the HLF forbidding the start of work on the project until an almost impossible series of hurdles had been jumped through with the bank.

However, all that done, we now have the grant of £10,000 paid into a new separate bank account. A budget agreed with the HLF dictates what we can spend it on and accounts will have to be returned to them in the spring of 2018. Any underspend has to be repaid. All is done that is except the main part of the work, which is getting this exhibition up and running for the summer. The working group has been meeting regularly and is now well organised to collect the information which we need from records available locally, the Imperial War Museum and the Regimental Museum. A small group of four is planning a two and a half day visit to Gouzeaucourt where they will interview people who have family memories of life under occupation, the destruction of the village and its aftermath. They will also spend a day in the WW1 museum in nearby Peronne to look up any relevant details held there and any records of Worcestershire men who fought in the area. Their work will be recorded on video and photographically to add to the exhibition material. So the content of the exhibition is coming together. The next big job is to get the nuts and bolts together as an exhibition and to create a web site as agreed with HLF. We plan to open in the Guildhall on 22nd July – the afternoon of the opening of the 3 Choirs Festival in Worcester – and Patrick Holcroft, the Lord Lieutenant of Worcestershire whose great-uncle fought in the area around Gouzeaucourt, has agreed to open it for us. It will be in the Guildhall for a week, and then we hope to move it to other locations. As the day draws nearer, the working group will be approaching all members to enlist as much help as possible.
